
quired units of study for the eight grade social studies curriculum.

My family lived in NYC (Alphabet City) for most of our lives, and it was there that I attended public elementary school.

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

Learning Through Oral History

As one of their projects this year, eight grade students will learn about how to conduct an oral history interview and have the option to create a documentary based on the life of an immigrant.

What is the LES Young Historians Curriculum?



This year all eight grade students will have a unique opportunity to be part of the **LES Young Historians curriculum during the school year**. The main objective of the program, which began in 2013, and was created by Christopher Piccigallo & Alfonso Guerriero, is to teach American history to our 8th graders by learning about the school's LES neighborhood. Our school is nestled within a neighborhood that has a wealth of history.

All eighth graders will not only learn American history but will also gain insight to their own cultural heritage through our studies.

Our program is distinct from most middle schools because we teach students to become historians/researchers as well as use elements of ethnography that include:

1. explore our school's neighborhood by going on organized walking tours and museum trips.
2. examine 19th century artifacts.
3. use our ephemera collection and taste various cultural foods from LES to determine the history and the similarities/differences of ethnicities.
4. when possible, conduct oral history interviews with local residents.

Furthermore our lessons emphasize content/skills based on specific units. The content and skills that are studied and learned along with their written reflections, will prepare students for high school. After each unit of study **students will be assessed on a Document Based**

Question (DBQ). A DBQ is a thematic based essay and assess how well a student writes a claim and supports his/her claim by using primary documents that are provided in each exam. This is an essential tool for high school because most NYC High Schools require students to complete a DBQ essay in order to receive a regents diploma. In addition there will be other projects due each time a unit of study is completed—parents/students should go to the LES website for due dates.



What is the Eighth Grade Social Studies Curriculum?

What will 8th graders learn this year? According to New York City Scope & Sequence K-8 Social Studies curriculum,—<http://schools.nycenet.edu/offices/teachlearn/ss/SocStudScopeSeq.pdf> (please download the curriculum.) 8th graders are required to learn the following: The Role of Gentrification on LES (neighborhood study), Industrial Revolution, Immigration, Progressive Movement, Roaring Twenties, Great Depression, Yellow Journalism, US Imperialism, World War I and II, & the Cold War. These topics will be covered through particular units in accordance to the *Common Core Standards*. I strongly encourage you to download these standards on our website-www.lesyounghistorians.com.
